He earned 3rd place in the History Bee and was a Finalist in the Geography Bee. These once again qualified him for Nationals in Orlando, Florida in May 2025. It also qualified him for the International History Olympiad in Paris, France and International Geography Olympiad in Bangkok, Thailand.

Last May, Ballard competed at the National History Bee and Geography Bee in Orlando, Florida. His achievements were: Bronze in Women's History, 4th Place Black History, 5th Place Maps & Flags, 7th Place Recent History, 10th Place American Geography, 11th Place Military History, 13th Place U.S. Geography Championship, 13th Place European Geography, 20th Place Ancient History, and 22nd Place.

He was a semifinalist in the U.S. History Bee, quarterfinalist in the National History Bee, and competed in the National Geography Bee and National Academic Bee. He was also chosen as the flag bearer for the state of Kansas and was a representative during the opening ceremonies. Grayson qualified for the International Geography Olympiad in Vienna, Austria & International History Olympiad in London, England. However, he chose not to attend these.

He also said, "My favorite part at nationals was competing in the history competitions. Also, I really liked getting DoorDash daily." In this packed and eventful 4 day competition, Grayson said, "I got a Dr. Seuss' question correct after hearing only the first five words about a book on Mulberry Street."

He will be working the state championship games' concession stands to fundraise for his National competitions, so come out and support him. Congratulations, Grayson and way to represent KC!


